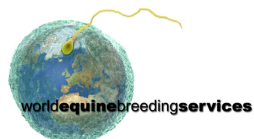

The bite should be even, and the eyes clear and shiny. A large jowl may mean difficulty in performing collected work. Finally nostrils should be clear and large to allow easy breathing.*

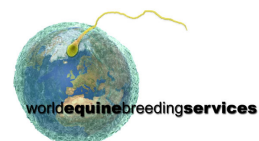

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The Neck: *A short and thick neck is indicative of power, whereas a longer, arched neck displays greater elegance. When riding, the head should not be in the riders lap (although this is often a matter of personal preference, and is not directly related to conformational correctness).*

The Shoulder: *the shoulder should not be too straight, as a straight shoulder produces a short, choppy stride, which is not ideal (unless you are breeding for driving). The shoulder should also be well-muscled without being too heavy.*

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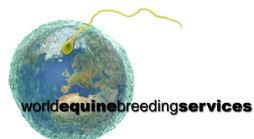
The Front Legs: *they should be well muscled, and of a good length, and straight. Incorrect conformation can lead to a susceptibility to tendon injuries, unusual gaits etc. Pastern slope should be just right; too much can cause tendon damage, too little can cause concussive damage to the foot.*

The Hooves: *these must be of good quality, and should point straight forward. Slight problems can be helped with corrective shoeing, but major problems should be a cause for concern when breeding as it may cause weakness in foals from a mare with poor quality/conformationally incorrect feet.*

The Chest: *the ribs should be well-sprung, with the space between the legs not being too narrow, but equally not too wide! A narrow chest restricts breathing during exercise, but a wide chest results in rolling action when ridden.*

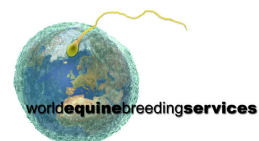
The Back: *should be well proportioned, and relatively flat. Length of back can be very important (a longer back is ideal for broodmares). Weaknesses in the back can lead to discomfort and injury of the animal in some circumstances.*

From the side, does the mare's back appear flat, roach-backed (curving up) or sway-backed (curving down)?

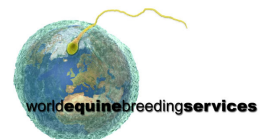
